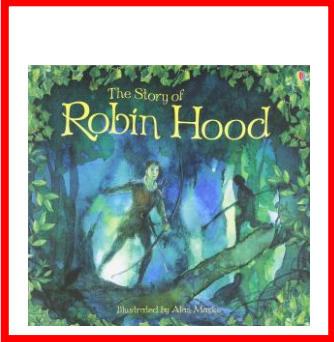

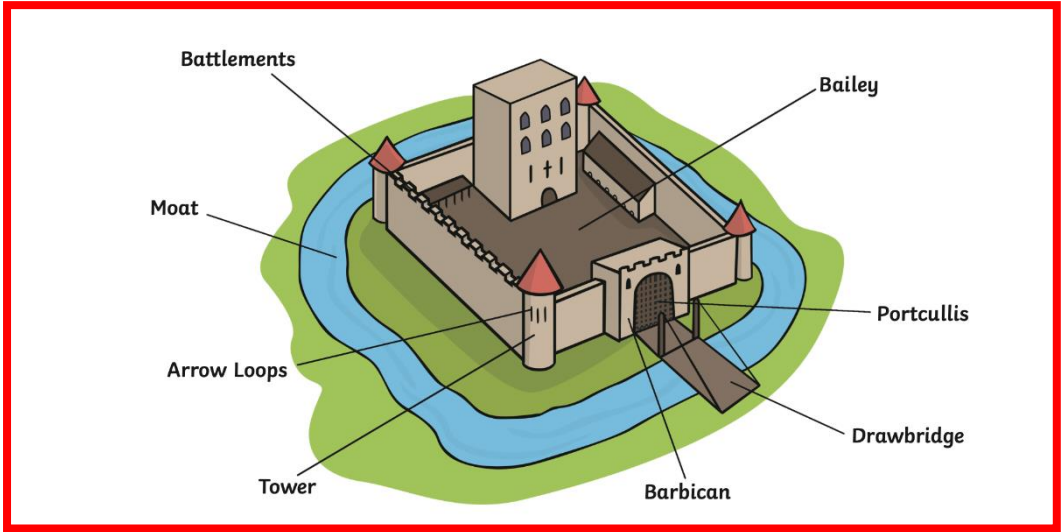
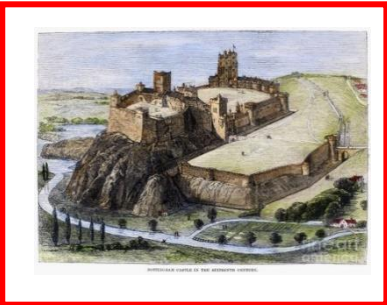

About the world:

- The medieval period in England was approximately 400 – 1400 BCE.
- Robin Hood was a famous outlaw who may have lived around the 1200 – 1300 BCE near Nottingham, England.
- A legend is a historical story some people think could be true.
- The story of Robin Hood is a **legend**. However, there are some real elements in the story such as the Major Oak tree found in Sherwood Forest and King John.
- Very specific hierarchy and roles existed in medieval society such as: royalty, nobility, peasantry and other roles like sheriff.
- Castles were used as defensive settlements in medieval England. The motte and bailey design was common and designs shared common features.
- King John (formerly Prince John) was king of England around 1000 years ago after trying to overthrow King Richard the Lionheart. John's supporters used Nottingham Castle as a base in their military campaign.
- The United Kingdom is formed of four countries including: England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.
- The compass points North, South, East and West are used to describe direction on a map.
- Near, far, left and right can be used to give directions.
